In the upside down kingdom, honor is greater than power.

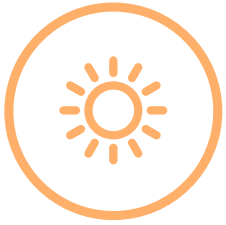
Week Three

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ENGAGE IN EVERYDAY MOMENTS TOGETHER



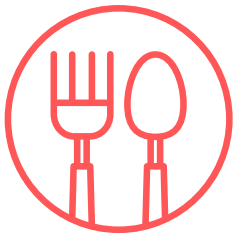
Morning Time
